INTRODUCTION TO THE BIBLE Daniel F. Cates

Part XXVI: Ezekiel

(*Continued from last week*) While the primary audience was God's captive children, Ezekiel prophesied to other peoples as well (e.g. Eze. 28:2; 29:3; 31:2). As his audience was two-fold, so was Ezekiel's purpose: first, to show Babylonian captives, who *still* lacked respect for God, signs by which they would recognize God as God (Eze. 24:24); second, to warn the enemies of God that destruction was at hand (Eze. 25-32,35).

The key words of Ezekiel are "rebellious" (found twenty-three times in its various forms, as a description of God's people), "nations" (used thirty-nine times, usually with regard to God's people's place in the world), "watchman" (used four times, both generally and as a description of Ezekiel), "shepherd" (used five times, with reference to what the Jews were lacking and what God and Jesus would be), and "glory" (used twenty-four times, usually as an attribute of God). The key phrases are "son of man" (applied ninety-three times to Ezekiel) and "shall know" (found sixty-one times, demonstrating the effectiveness of God's working). The key verse is the one which has already been introduced which shows that Ezekiel was a sign (Eze. 24:24). The key passage is Ezekiel 33:31-32 which shows that Ezekiel was heard, but the people did not *listen* to obey. The key chapters are Ezekiel 34 (which condemns Israel's bad shepherds) and Ezekiel 36,37 (which show the land of Israel renewed).

There are many important lessons in the book of Ezekiel, including these: first, whether people listen or not, a faithful preacher of Truth has an effect (Eze. 2:5; 33:33); second, at times the very ones who need to hear will not listen, though others would (Eze. 3:4-7); third, the soul that sins is the one that dies (Eze. 18:4,20); fourth, all nations are amenable to God (Eze. 25-32,35)--this lesson is a continual one through the prophets; fifth, the Lord takes no pleasure in the death of the wicked (Eze. 33:11); sixth, good leadership is essential (Eze. 34); seventh, bad shepherds are tantamount to no shepherds (Eze. 34:8), and, eighth, God's plan was for one nation to be under one King, one Shepherd, one God (Eze. 37:22-24).

This is an appropriate point to introduce apocalyptic literature, since the book of Ezekiel is the first book to really implement such--though not the last, for Daniel, Zechariah, and the Revelation (which Greek name is *apocalupsis* [ἀποκάλυψις]), all

employ large amounts of apocalyptic language and numerous other books, especially the prophets, use this form in varying degrees. The Greek word literally means to "off" "cover" or "uncover" or "reveal." This language is highly symbolic so that Truth can be discernible to those who would have an ear to hear (Rev. 2:7; et al; cf Mat. 13:9) but indiscernible to those whose motives would harm the Message or the audience of It.

"That we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive; But speaking the truth in love, may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ:" (Ephesians 4:14,15)
